Higher Kinnerton Walking Group by Michael Collins

In January, 27 of us completed a circular route alongside the River Dee between the two steel bridges before stopping at The Central Hotel for refreshments.

Bit of trivia - both bridges originally opened to allow ships to pass through.

The Jubilee Bridge which is the road bridge was opened in 1927. It is so called because it replaced the original bridge which was opened in 1897 which was the diamond jubilee of Queen Victoria. This bridge was originally a lifting bridge but now has a fixed roadway. It is a rare example of a Bascule bridge.

The rail bridge opened on 3 August 1889 and at the time was the largest swing bridge in the UK. The moving central section weighs 765 tons and is 85 metres long and took 40 seconds to



open. It has now been welded closed and was last opened in 1960.

Her great love was her garden, which was the centre-piece of the village and was always greatly admired and singled out each year by the Best Kept Village judges, but it is now sadly no more. She was a fighter and overcame diabetes, colitis, breast cancer and other illnesses but, unfortunately, try as she did, she could not beat dementia.

Beryl was cremated at Chester Crematorium on 4th January 2023.

Higher Kinnerton Environmental Group News

Reading through the article "2022: A review of the Higher Kinnerton year" in last month's newsletter, there were lots of exciting things happening in the village throughout the year including tree planting early on in February, the Village Pollinator Garden competition in the summer and Spring Blub Planting in October. Some of these events are a consequence of the Nature Wardens Project which was launched back in Summer 2019. The wildflower areas in the church and main park as well as the willow tunnel, community orchard and hedgerows were all developed and maintained through the Nature Wardens Project and

separate initiatives with Flintshire County Council and featured in the judges' comments for the Higher Kinnerton Silver Award for Best Kept Community Village, along with the well cared for planters and well-kept allotment area.

Following on from this success, we are hoping to continue to improve and enhance our village environment and would like to invite members of the community to join us. We are hoping to organise an event for the Higher Kinnerton Environmental Group in March to give people an opportunity to get involved



and to have a say in the future direction of the group – details in the next Newsletter! Biodiversity Blog: February by Anjela Jones

It may not be the end of winter, but spring can still unofficially start in February. Changing weather patterns have seen some bursts of unseasonably warm weather in recent years which can play a trick on



Mother Nature. Bees react to temperature changes so if we get a warm spell, you may find a few Queens out a bit too early. Consider having some early growing bulbs in your garden such as snowdrops, muscari and crocus to support any early risers. February is also a good time for planting trees and getting nest boxes up and ready for the nesting season from March onwards.

Remember the main nesting season for the UK is March – August so cut back any trees or hedges by the end of February. It is an offence under Section 1 of the Wildlife

and Countryside Act of 1981 to intentionally take, damage or destroy the nest of any wild bird while it is in use or being built, or to intentionally kill, injure or take chicks or adults, or intentionally take or destroy any eggs.

Higher Kinnerton Biodiversity Programme

Following on from the successful wildflower seeding in the main park, off park avenue, Flintshire County Council have agreed to continue the seed planting on the recreation ground, Main Road. The areas around the field will be seeded early this year, and be left to grow throughout the spring and summer. A single cut, collect and removal of the cuttings in Autumn is needed (it is recommended this cut take place any time between mid-August to mid-October). This timing of the cut allows all of the wildflowers to set seed.

The bulb planting outside the scout hut and along the hedgerow last Autumn was very popular, with many Higher Kinnerton residents helping out. Also the children of years 5 and 6 at Ysgol Derwen planted dozens of trees late last year around the school field. Along with all the magnificent flowers, trees, bushes and hedgerows that Higher Kinnerton home owners lovingly care for, our community is sending a positive message that biodiversity is close to all of our hearts.

We will keep you updated with even more areas being looked at to help reintroduce wildlife back into our community.

Natural Resources Wales: lose yourself in the Great Outdoors

More and more of us are looking for ways to destress as we try to cope with the modern day work-life balance. There are many ways to do this - exercise, sport, a good book, listening to music or enjoying the Great Outdoors. Natural Resources Wales (NRW) has a number of functions, including the management of over 550km of waymarked walking trails, 600km of waymarked mountain biking and cycling trails, some 100km of waymarked running trails and 30km of waymarked horse-riding trails.



The Welsh Government has launched 2023 as The Year of Trails and NRW are aiming to encourage people to get out and explore as part of a celebration of Wales' trails, hopefully discovering some new places along the way. Clare Pillman, NRW's Chief Executive said:

"There is a trail for each of us. Long or short; mountain, forest or coast; walking, riding, running or cycling – NRW managed trails have it all!

And for 2023 there is an open invitation for bikers, hikers and riders; and for ramblers, explorers, and commuters to discover everything our nation has to offer.

These trails are a place for reflection, relaxation and recreation, connecting us to each other as well as to the stories and histories of Wales. But they also deliver a host of benefits – for us, our children, our bodies and our souls."

Here in north-east Wales there are any number of such places with trails, nature reserves, woodlands and open access land - you probably know some already. Many of these are within easy reach of us here in Higher Kinnerton and can make a great day out, or a place to go for a couple of hours. They all have well waymarked routes and most are great for families and us older folk. Many of the trails provide easy access for everyone, though some demand a level of fitness which some might find harder. In turn this may well encourage you to explore even more, there are all manner of woodlands and countryside with open access.. The North Wales Wildlife Trust, for example, own a number of woodlands near us which provide a variety of walks and activities. The Natural Resources Wales website has a number of guides to locations across the whole of Wales, including north-east Wales, and is well worth a visit. For each location there are maps which can be downloaded, along with details of walks, cycle trails, visitor amenities (including cafés!) and how to get there. There are also details of accessible walking trails suitable for all abilities

If you have never really explored our local woodlands and hillsides they are well worth a visit, whether it be on foot or bike. It should be stressed that other outdoor facilities are available - such as Halkyn Mountain, Waun y Llyn on Hope Mountain, and Plas Power Woods (near Wrexham), to name but a few. With spring (hopefully) just around the corner and the days getting ever longer it is a good time to be getting out and about and enjoying our wonderful natural world and taking time off from our everyday lives to enjoy some quality personal and family time.




