# **Biodiversity Blog: May**

Hawthorn Blossom will be in abundance in May hence it sometimes being called the Mayflower and it's also peak season for bluebell carpets. In the garden please consider taking part in Plant Life's **No Mow May**.

Help bees and other pollinators this spring by leaving the mower in the shed for a little longer. **No Mow May** is a national campaign by Plantlife.org.uk which is encouraging people to resist the urge to have a neat and tidy lawn and instead to let it grow to support pollinators at the beginning of the season.

Weeds are just wildflowers' growing where you don't want them, with dandelions being the big bad wolves of gardening, misrepresented and given a bad reputation, but they are a rich early food source for our precious pollinators along with other 'weeds' such as clover and buttercups.

Plantlife are asking us to leave the mower in the shed and let our lawns go wild for a month then at the end, take part in their 'every flower counts survey' to see how many bees



the UK's lawns can feed. Not only will you receive your very own "nectar score" (which will tell you have many bees your lawn can feed), you'll help them learn more about the health of the nations' wildflowers.

Do we really need perfect lawns? Lawns became a status symbol with its origins in the aristocracy, much like having bad teeth from eating sugary foods, having a lawn was a way of showing off how rich you were because you could afford to maintain grass that didn't need to be used for food production.

To maintain our perfect lawns to impress ourselves and our neighbours, we need to use fertilisers, and these can run off into our water systems via drains and cause harm to wildlife. Having a lawn is much better for the environment than paving it or using gravel as grass can sequester up to 3 tonnes of carbon per hectare a year but does it need to be perfect? We've changed our mindset on bad teeth so maybe now is the time to change our mindset on perfect lawns and let them go a bit wild and see what beauty they hold.

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# My visit to Liberia by Caroline Harcourt

I've recently returned from a two week visit to Sue, a good friend and fellow primatologist, who is the Director of Libassa Wildlife Sanctuary in Liberia, West Africa. The sanctuary was opened in 2017 and is the only place in Liberia to rescue and care for all species of wild animal (except

chimpanzees, which go to a place dedicated to their well-being). The vision of Libassa is "to be a sanctuary with no animals — this would mean that all the awareness and education in the country has worked and nobody kills, eats, captures or keeps Liberian wildlife". Sadly, this vision is still a long way from being achieved. Although it is illegal to kill or keep wild animals in the country, it is very difficult to enforce the law and many of the rural people are not aware of

the rules. Bushmeat (i.e. that from wild animals) is frequently sold on the roadside and, perhaps worse, young animals, particularly monkeys, are kept as pets, often in appalling conditions. Once

big enough, when they are not so appealing, they too may well end up in the pot.


Most of the creatures in the sanctuary are monkeys, but there are also pangolins, crocodiles, a variety of bird species, duikers (a type of antelope), civets, squirrels, tortoises, snakes and, indeed, needs anything else that rescuing. Recently, this has included a racoon from USA which was a stowaway on a ship! The idea is to release as many as possible back into the wild once they have been treated for any injuries or have grown up enough to survive. Some though, can never be let go, such as the blind dwarf crocodile and blind parrot that were in the sanctuary when I visited. Permanent residents like these, and the temporary ones, are used for educating visitors to the sanctuary about the importance conserving the animals and their habitats.

Many of those that are rescued are, when fit, released into a protected area near the border with Sierra Leonne. Probably the

most charismatic of these, to me, is the pangolin or scaly anteater. I had the absolute thrill of feeding the tiny one that had been found and brought to Libassa weighing a mere 120g, probably just a day or two old. Her mother will have been killed and eaten, with her scales removed and likely sold to superstitious people in Asia who think they will gain some benefit from something that is made of exactly the same substance as our fingernails!

Pangolins, all eight species of them (four in Africa and four in Asia) are traded on an enormous scale. Probably over a million have been killed in the last decade. Indeed, they are the most trafficked animal in the world. What a tragedy.

Monkeys are very difficult to release, especially those caught as youngsters as they have no idea what to eat, where to go or what is dangerous. Most primates live in groups, so even an individual adult is unlikely to survive if released into an unknown area with no group mates. Soon after I left the sanctuary, the culmination of years of preparation, the release of some sooty mangabeys finally happened. A group of



over twenty them were taken to a forested area and let go after some days in an enclosure there.

team of four people will live in the forest for a year and keep track of the monkeys, providing extra food until they have learned to find their own and ensuring that they are doing well. Fingers crossed that they thrive.

I spent most of my time at the sanctuary because Sue couldn't take time off from her work - it is more than a full-time job; a staff member has to be present 24 hours a day 365 days of the year. However, we did

manage to slip away to two sites, one a pleasant area of waterfalls and the other was Sapo, the country's only National Park. The latter was about 220 miles from the sanctuary and took around

11 hours to reach because of the terrible road. I'll complain about never Kinnerton's potholes again! It was huge adventure that really enjoyed, but it certainly isn't a country for comfortloving tourists or, sadly, for people wanting to see wildlife.

# **Higher Kinnerton Walking Group**

In April we headed to Alyn Waters Country Park and finished at the Cafe for coffee and cake. Bit of trivia - during the 16th century the park was part of a large country estate centred around Gwersyllt Hall. The owners sided with the Royalists during the Civil War and in 1645 the Hall was severely

damaged by the Roundheads. The park was popular amongst the gentry as a venue for archery. The Hall was demolished in 1910 due to mining subsidence and in 1953 MacAlpines bought the land to quarry. Some of the sand and gravel removed from the site was used to build the giant Llyn Brenig Dam. In 1966 whilst digging for gravel part of a mammoth's huge tusk was uncovered which is now in Liverpool Museum. In 1988 Wrexham Council bought the land and converted it to a country park. Alyn Waters is now the largest Country Park in the Wrexham area and is situated either side of the beautiful River Alyn with its lovely riverside walks and is a Green Flag Award accredited site.

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
