Eco-friendly Christmas wrapping ideas

As the festive season approaches many of us will be thinking about decorating the house and ensuring that we have enough wrapping paper(in the UK, on average, we get through a staggering 227,000 miles of it over the festive season!). Some of the paper, and other festive wrapping, can be recycled however not all can. There are some things that we can do to ensure a more sustainable Christmas.

- •Where possible reuse wrapping paper or use paper/fabric gift bags.
- •Buy paper that doesn't contain glitter, or metallic effects, as these can't be recycled.
- •Recycle paper in the kerbside recycling remembering to remove any sticky tape first.
- •Estimates indicate that the UK uses 40 million rolls of Sellotape each Christmas so consider using the new plastic free Sellotape. Other tape alternatives include Washi (paper based) and other paper parcel tapes. Look for those with natural rubber adhesives.



- •Brown paper/newspaper can be an alternative to wrapping paper and can be customized with ribbon, string, natural jute twine or recycled cotton ribbon which can be reused afterwards.
- •If you are feeling particularly creative you could try the Japanese inspired art of wrapping gifts, known as Furoshiki, using fabric which can be washed and reused.
- •Before considering your wrapping options this Christmas, maybe first consider your gift purchases. Of all the gift purchases made, here in the UK, a mere 1% will still be used 6 months after the big day!

Rewilding the UK – Lessons from Knepp Estate

This summer, I spent five days in one of the most inspiring and biodiverse places that I have ever visited in the UK - Knepp Estate. Situated in the heart of Sussex, only a short train journey from London and just 16 miles from Gatwick airport, it is not a place where one would expect to find one of the pioneering rewilding projects in the country. Yet this 1,400-hectare site is becoming a sanctuary for wildlife, a small stronghold in a nature-depleted landscape.



As recent as two decades ago, Knepp Estate was under intensive agriculture. After many years of ploughing, fertilisers, and pesticides, the soil was in a dire state, and the land had become a hostile place for nature. Yet agriculture here was not sustainable, due to the fact that it was extremely difficult to farm on the clay soils. So as profits began to stall, owners Charlie Burrell and Isabella Tree took the brave decision to transform their farmland into "a biodiverse wilderness area". The rewilding project had begun.

In summary, their strategy was to reintroduce missing species to the ecosystem so that it could function with minimal human intervention. Grazing animals play the crucial role of controlling the growth of vegetation, maintaining some areas as open grassland while other areas become scrub and woodland, creating a rich mosaic of habitats. In the UK, there used to be elk, bison, boars, and now-extinct aurochs (giant cattle) and tarpan (ancient horses); but now the habitat-shaping function of these animals has been lost from our landscape. At Knepp, modern equivalents of these animals have been reintroduced and now roam free. They are known as the "Knepp Big Five": red and fallow deer, Tamworth pigs, longhorn cattle, and Exmoor ponies.

In a surprisingly short space of time, the landscape at Knepp has undergone an incredible transformation. There is an astounding diversity of habitats in such close proximity. Fields are now scattered with wildflowers, thickets and shrub, humming with insects and filled with birdsong. Wetlands have formed following the reintroduction of European beavers and the re-naturalisation of waterways running through the estate. White storks nest in majestic open-growth oak trees, which tower over the emerging scrubland. As I explored this wonderful place, it was hard to believe that only a few years ago what I was standing on would have been a monoculture farm no different to those across the country. It is unlike anything I have seen before in the UK.

What makes Knepp unique is its approach to conservation: rather than setting out with targets or goals in mind, a lowintervention approach is taken which lets nature lead the way. This has meant that a habitat has been produced which is the preference of nature, rather than what we humans assume is best for it. Species have come together like pieces in a jigsaw, interacting to create a functioning ecosystem, completing the full picture.

This has made Knepp a hotspot for biodiversity, as rare and



thriving populations of red-listed birds including turtle doves, nightingales and green woodpeckers, as well as all five of the UK's owl species. With the absence of agricultural chemicals, insects are thriving, with a staggering 1,800 invertebrate species recorded on site - for example, it has by far the largest population of rare purple emperor butterflies in the country. Knepp has 13 out of the 17 UK breeding bat species, and the numbers of small mammals like hedgehogs and harvest mice are booming... The list goes on. I probably saw more species within the five days here than I have during the entirety of the past year! Knepp is surpassing all expectations, demonstrating the success rewilding schemes can have.

Rewilding not only benefits nature, but people too. It has the potential to play a large role in mitigating and adapting to climate change. The rewilded land acts as a massive carbon store. Healthier and more biodiverse soils are not only richer in natural nutrients but store more carbon - increasing the quantity organic matter in the world's soils by as little as 0.4% each year would absorb the same amount of carbon


dioxide that we emit globally! In addition, the land now holds more water, protecting downstream areas from floods and providing resilience to droughts. The Knepp Wildlands eco-tourism scheme now provides



the estate with double the profits than farming had done before, showing that nature has a strong economical and recreational value too.

Knepp should act as a beacon of hope for nature recovery. It has demonstrated how quickly nature can bounce back and thrive when given the opportunity to express itself. Rewilding can help us to tackle the climate crisis and the sixth mass

extinction, to create more sustainable agricultural systems, and to improve our environment. In the light of the 2023 State of Nature Report, which highlights



that 1 in 6 UK species are threatened with extinction, it is now clearer than ever that we need to take urgent action to conserve biodiversity. Rewilding should undoubtedly be a key part of our strategy on the journey to restore the natural world.

Interested to find out more about rewilding at Knepp? I would highly recommend reading *Wilding* by Isabella Tree; it gives a detailed account of the

story of Knepp Estate, supported by ecological theory, set against the backdrop of the country's biodiversity crisis. You can also find lots of information on Knepp's website https://knepp.co.uk/rewilding/

I completed Operation Wallacea's "Field Skills for Wildlife Management Careers" five-day course, camping within Knepp Estate for the duration. I learned how to survey for a variety of taxa, while collecting data to monitor biodiversity on the site. This is supplemented by lectures from ecologists and professionals from Knepp, giving participants a deeper understanding of the rewilding movement. This course is open to anyone from all age groups.

Wales Air Ambulance Quiz Winners
